



I'm just going to come out and say it – Transfiguration is a weird festival. It's this strange thing that happened, seemingly out of nowhere and for no reason. Jesus goes up on a mountain and suddenly glows. He talks to Moses and Elijah, the disciples are freaked out (my interpretation) and Peter babbles about putting up tents, and then God the Father talks about Jesus to the disciples. It's weird. The story is only in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, by the way. Not John. (Are we surprised? No, we are not!) And because we are in Matthew's gospel this year, I'll focus on that one. But some of the aspects of this text are

in all three gospels.

For one – the Transfiguration happens at the same relative time in all three gospels. Jesus has previously asked the disciples who everyone says He is. And they say, "John the Baptist, Elijah, or one of the prophets." Then He asks what they think and Peter gets it right. "You are the Messiah." Then Jesus predicts His death and resurrection for the first time and Peter gets angry. Jesus rebukes Peter and tells them all that if they want to follow Him, they must deny themselves, take up their cross and follow. This basic pattern is in all three gospels, almost all exactly the same. Some time after this, Jesus takes Peter, James and John (the big three) up on a mountain with Him where He commences to glow.

What does that tell us? The disciples have just heard that they must do something not only difficult, but downright terrifying – risk themselves for Jesus. "Take up your cross" might seem like a cliché to us, but it would have been horrifying for them. Being willing to do or say things that might land them on a cross was nothing to just shrug off. It was a hideously painful and humiliating way to die. So I have to wonder if the Transfiguration was for their (and our) benefit – to give us hope and encouragement for the difficult days of following that lay ahead.

What do we see happening? Jesus doesn't just 'shine.' He glows or radiates light from within. He is not reflecting light – He is light. And He is speaking with Moses (the Law) and Elijah (the prophets). It seems to me that what we have here is a vision of the end times, when Jesus has fully and finally fulfilled all the Law and prophets. Of the future glory and majesty of Christ when He comes again.

I think in the Transfiguration Jesus is showing us the future, our future, when all that we have been struggling with, all that has been weighing us down, all the difficulties and pain are over. This is an *eschatological* vision. Eschatology is concerned with the end times and the Second Coming of Christ. And regardless of what some say, it is not intended to be scary. It is intended to produce hope. We hope in the coming of the Lord because we know that God loves us, forgives us, sent Jesus to die for us *so that* at the end we could be with God. Visions and stories of the end times are hopeful and inspiring because God wins! Light and goodness and love win over darkness and evil and hate.

So as weird as the Transfiguration is, it tells us that no matter what else is going on, no matter what we are or will face, our victory in Christ is assured. We may be hurting now, but it won't always be so. We may be struggling and it may feel overwhelming, but our future is safe with God. There is a reason that the Church puts Transfiguration as the last Sunday before Lent – but I would argue that it is important to keep in mind throughout the year. No matter what happens, God wins (and so will we!).



The worship will include distribution of Ashes and Communion.




Bethel is looking for Sunday Drivers.

Wednesday nights in Lent
Sing with All the Saints in Glory: A Lenten
Midweek Series

Lent is a time of renewal. We focus on the death and resurrection of Jesus—and in turn focus on our own death and resurrection found in baptism. We who have been baptized into Christ have died to sin and are righteous saints of God. At the same time, we know that we struggle daily with sin as we seek to follow Jesus. This is the wonderful Lutheran understanding of sinner and saint.

We have a rich calendar of saints in the Lutheran tradition—Christians from every age who have pointed to Christ in their living and dying. This year, our midweek services will honor the commemorations that occur during the weeks of Lent. In remembering these Christians who have gone before, we find inspiration for our Christian journey as we are further connected with our history and the Church across time and space.

Week 1: Inheritance of Faith – George Herbert; John Wesley & Charles Wesley.

Week 2: Perseverance with Endurance – Perpetua & Felicity; Harriet Tubman & Sojourner Truth

Week 3: Faithful in Prayer – Gregory the Great; St. Patrick

Week 4: Striving for Justice – St. Joseph, Guardian of Our Lord; Oscar Romero.

Week 5: Dying and Rising with Christ – Hans Nielsen Hauge; John Donne

Monthly Financial Update

Miscellaneous Revenues

The Revenues taken into account are all weekly and holiday offerings as well as special offerings designated to the general account such as Fuel, Missions, and Food Shelf Offerings. This comparison is only for Revenues and Expenses associated with Bethel's responsibility for our parish budget, meaning checks from Hemnes Lutheran Church are not included in the Year to Date Revenue and their 25% share of our



parish budget is not included in the Year to Date Budgeted Expenses. This comparison also does not take into account Refunds and Reimbursements or Savings Reimbursements. These sources of revenue are normally received to pay expenses that are not a part of Bethel's operating budget, so are not used to make comparison to our budgeted expenses.

The Year to Date difference will show on a monthly basis if we are receiving sufficient offerings to cover our budget, or if we are behind. The running total for each month will be in a Year to Date total, not a monthly total.

If it is necessary to borrow money from Savings Reserves to fund the operations of Bethel, the amount will be denoted in the Cash Reserves Expended column. If funds are repaid to the Savings Reserves during a surplus, the repayment will be denoted in the Cash Reserves Repaid column. Reserves Expended and Reserves Repaid are not represented in the Revenues and Expenses columns of this report.



- Blueberries


What you do:
