





This month marks the Church's transition from festival time to Ordinary Time. It's pretty much been one festival or observance after another since the end of November – the beginning of Advent. Especially this year where we only had a few Sundays after Epiphany before we dove headlong into Lent. But May 28th was the Festival of Pentecost which brings the formal celebration of Easter to a close. I say "formal" because every Sunday is celebrated as a "little Easter."

The switch to Ordinary Time also marks our return to the gospel according to St. Matthew. We haven't heard from Matthew since Easter Day, but we will be immersed in this gospel (for the most part) until the end of the year. So now seems like

the time to think a little about this gospel in a broad sense. The best way to do that, of course, is to read it through. We will be hearing most of it on Sunday mornings, but like any good story, it's better to read it though as a whole.

One of the first things to remember is that Matthew was writing to a community of believers sometime around 80 or 90 A.D. These were mostly Jewish Christians or Gentiles who didn't know much about the Jewish faith or life. As a result, a main theme in this gospel is that of identity. What does it mean to be a Christian? Especially since Christ had ascended back into heaven, but had not yet returned. The first disciples thought He'd be right back, but it's been fifty years or more. Thus Matthew's gospel is often referred to as "the teaching gospel." A large part of the book is devoted to the five "Great Discourses" of Jesus – five different times when Jesus speaks uninterrupted – teaching the disciples about what it means to be His followers, who He is as Christ and Son of God, and, in turn, who God is..

Like the other two Synoptic Gospels (Mark and Luke), Matthew is a narrative – a story – the central meaning of which is found in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, Son of God. This Passion story is what makes the gospels Gospels (Good News) and not just interesting stories about a guy who lived a long time ago and could do amazing things. All the teaching in Matthew, all the questions and answers about identity, revolve around this one point: Jesus Christ is the Son of God Who came into the world to die for the world in order that the world could be put back into a right relationship with God the Father.

So if we identify ourselves as followers of Jesus, then Matthew helps us to understand what that entails. How do Jesus' followers act? How does Jesus want and expect us to live our lives? What are our values? What does it mean that Jesus is Emmanuel, "God with us?" These are the questions Matthew's community were asking in their time, they are the questions we are asking in ours.

The first three months of Ordinary Time (Summer!) is not usually noted for the number of people flocking to worship on Sunday mornings. J And while it's perfectly understandable that we take some time for recreation (re-creation), I'm going to ask you not to give up worship for the summer. This is Minnesota. Unless you are in the middle of the deep woods or afloat in the Boundary Waters, there is most likely a church pretty close by no matter where you go. Probably even a Lutheran one! But really, it doesn't matter – in fact, it might be fun to check out a denomination you've never been to before (bring me a bulletin!).

Ordinary Time is teaching time. It's growing time. It's the time when the Church settles in after the whirl of festivals and celebrations to really think about and reflect on what those celebrations mean for us. That Jesus came to earth, born of a human mother in a lowly stable. That strangers from afar traveled hundreds of miles just to see him. That He willingly gave His life for you and for me, so that we would never be separated from God. That He rose triumphant on the third day, defeating death forever. And that He ascended back into heaven, sending us the Holy Spirit to lead us, teach us, comfort us, support and defend us. Maybe Ordinary Time isn't all that ordinary after all!

CELEBRATE 150 "SNIP IT"

Snip its (little pieces) of memories from the past:- Ladies Aid Members

"Mrs. Inga Arneson Olson: (b. 1894–d.1975) joined "Aid" in 1920 when she married Olaf Olson and joined Porter Lutheran Church."



"Inga seldom missed Aid, (Ladies Aid was an important part of the faith life of women in the Porter Lutheran Church) but it was often a problem for her to get there. She often walked. She said 'The road was wide and no excuse to stay at home. When there is a will, there is a way' says Inga and also "Vilja drag halle lasse."

"She has come to town in a lumber wagon, has taken her food to the road in a little wagon and caught a ride with some of her neighbors. She says, 'with the help of others it can be done'".

"Inga was always willing and ready to help anyone in need of help both in the church and in one's home."

Monthly Financial Update

Miscellaneous Revenues

The Revenues taken into account are all weekly and holiday offerings as well as special offerings designated to the general account such as Fuel, Missions, and Food Shelf Offerings. This comparison is only for Revenues and Expenses associated with Bethel's responsibility for our parish budget, meaning checks from Hemnes Lutheran Church are not included in the Year to Date Revenue and their 25% share of our



parish budget is not included in the Year to Date Budgeted Expenses. This comparison also does not take into account Refunds and Reimbursements or Savings Reimbursements. These sources of revenue are normally received to pay expenses that are not a part of Bethel's operating budget, so are not used to make comparison to our budgeted expenses.

The Year to Date difference will show on a monthly basis if we are receiving sufficient offerings to cover our budget, or if we are behind. The running total for each month will be in a Year to Date total, not a monthly total.

If it is necessary to borrow money from Savings Reserves to fund the operations of Bethel, the amount will be denoted in the Cash Reserves Expended column. If funds are repaid to the Savings Reserves during a surplus, the repayment will be denoted in the Cash Reserves Repaid column. Reserves Expended and Reserves Repaid are not represented in the Revenues and Expenses columns of this report.



Make this cute puppet to show and tell the amazing story of metamorphosis



What you need:

- Needle and string
- 12 small pom-poms
- Wooden
 craft stick
- Scissors
- Googly eyes
- Glue
- Coffee filter
- Markers

What you do:

- 1. Sew pom-poms together to make a caterpillar body. Tie off that string.
- 2. Thread another string up through the first pompom, leaving 12 inches to dangle. Repeat with the ninth pompom, leaving two dangling strings.
- 3. Wrap those strings around opposite ends of the stick, adjusting their length to about 6 inches. Tie in place.
- 4. Glue on eyes.
- 5. Flatten the coffee filter and draw a symmetrical design on it. Pleat in the center to create wings.
- Move the caterpillar puppet by holding the stick. Glue on the wings as you describe the transformation into a butterfly.
